# **OBJECTIVES**

Students will...

- Begin editing their film
- Organize selects into a rough cut based on their paper edit
- Learn about the editing process and schedule
- Collaborate with crew members, and plan for upcoming review stages

#### **EDITING SCHEDULE**

Meet with your crew to create a schedule based on the different cuts of your film. You don't have to use every checkpoint, but make sure that the entire crew has a chance to provide input and that you're keeping the final due date of the film in mind.

#### **EDITING SCHEDULE**

Your film will go through multiple stages before the final version, here are some different versions of it that you might see:

- Rough cut, also known as an assembly cut, will be the arrangement of your selects based off your outline without any other added effects
- Editor's cut, this will be your editor's vision of the film before receiving notes.
- Director's cut, this will be the version of your film after being adjusted based on notes from the director
- Producer's cut, this will be the version of your film after being adjusted based on notes from the producer
- Final cut, this will be the version you show your class and it will include input from all members of your crew



### TO DO:

- Meet with your crew and review your dallies
- Transcribe your footage
- As you review your footage, take note of what shots you might want to use
- Annotate your transcript
- Work on outlining you film
- Finish creating an editing schedule
