

LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

The MY HERO Project was launched online as a nonprofit educational project to celebrate the best of humanity through media, art and technology. The founders - filmmakers and mothers - wanted to create an alternative to the violence, sexism and racial inequity so prevalent in the mass media. They built a safe place online for people to share stories of real-life heroes from all walks of life who had overcome obstacles and adversity, faced challenges and persevered to create positive change in the world and in their communities.

The MY HERO website went online in 1995 and the response was immediate: MY HERO had touched a nerve worldwide, filling a vacuum with much needed positive content. Teachers, students, parents, writers and artists posted stories about their heroes in the guestbook and mailed art and stories to contribute to the website. To protect children from harmful content, a fledging staff reviewed all content submitted to the website and approved prior to publication.

With the advance of broadband technology and affordable mobile media devices, the Board launched The MY HERO International Film Festival in 2005. Leaders in philanthropy committed to peace, human rights and empowering women support the festival with special cash prizes for professional and student films. Short films and filmmakers from around the world are celebrated annually at the festival and online. All winning films become part of MY HERO's media library and are curated into lesson plans on a wide range of subjects for students of all ages.

Since 1995 over 100 million people have taken part in MY HERO's festivals, social media and in school programs, using and contributing content to our ever-growing online media library. Lesson plans have been shared across the country and world, and accompanying Professional Development for Teachers, Media Arts Workshops, Internship Programs, Salons and Festivals have deepened the impact in schools, in communities and, powerfully, on individuals.

This year's annual report addresses the "Why" of MY HERO. As research deepens our understanding of the impact of positive stories about heroes, I hope you will have a better understanding of the importance of our work and our reach. Please know how much we value your support and participation.




These are the tools in desperate need at home, in school and in the community. As the needs grow, so will MY HERO. One story at a time.



WHY STUDY HEROES?

In classrooms around the world, students explore the MY HERO multimedia library to then identify and create media to honor their personal heroes. Sharing these stories, art and films promotes cross-cultural understanding and encourages dialogue about values and character. Through these examples, students can find support and pathways to guide their own success.

The relatively new discipline of "Heroism Science" examines the different expressions of heroism and their impact on society.

Research on teaching heroism shows that heroes:

- uplift others inspire and offer hope
- protect and help others to cope, providing emotional and social support
- provide an important role in support of identity exploration and formation
- provide a clearer sense of self

IMPACT on Youth

Giving youth a voice and encouragement to explore and connect with those who inspire them has a profound impact. Mohamed is now an international lawyer, advisor to the Director-General of UNESCO and serves on MY HERO's Board of Directors.


IMPACT on Children and Families

Mattie J. T. Stepanek, as a young child, suffered from dysautonomic mitochondrial myopathy, a rare disorder that took the lives of his three older siblings. After Mattie was nominated as a MY HERO by the Children's Hospice International World Conference, MY HERO's Jeanne Meyers reached out to Mattie's mother to see how the organization could help. Through generous corporate donations Mattie received a computer so he could share his poems with the world. By the time Mattie was twelve years old, he had published five New York Times-bestselling books and had met all of his personal heroes, including Oprah Winfrey. His hero, former U.S. President Jimmy Carter, described Stepanek as "the most extraordinary person whom I have ever known."

Jeni Stepanek, Mattie's mother, spoke of MY HERO's role in Mattie's life:

"It was about 20 years ago when MY HERO chose to honor Mattie
who was only 6 years old at the time, as a poet hero. MY HERO gave
Mattie, a little boy, a platform for sharing his HEARTSONGS, his
messages of purpose, purpose for himself and purpose for all of us.
When Mattie died in 2004 just before his 14th birthday MY HERO
was a place where global neighbors shared comments and thoughts
about Mattie. About their grief and about their ongoing hope for
peace routed in lessons they had learned from this little boy."

IMPACT on New Filmmakers

Slater Jewell-Kemker is an award-winning film director who learned her craft as a youth reporter for The MY HERO Project. Her feature documentary, "Youth Unstoppable," which covers young people on the front lines of climate change, has screened at the United Nations and festivals around the world. Slater gives workshops on filmmaking within the youth climate community, empowering young people to tell their own stories that promote a sustainable, caring world.
