Schedule for Learning Circles

Session 1 (September to January):

Begins late September and ends in mid-January (16 weeks with a 2-week break in December). Learning Circle Placement forms are due in early September.

Session 2 (January to May):

Begins late January and ends in late May (15 weeks with a 1-week break in Spring). Learning Circle Placement forms are due early January.
